<u>May 17, 1902</u>

Wilmington and Durham are scoreless in the sixth inning when Wilmington manager Edgar Bear pulls his team off the field following a call by umpire George Proud. Proud then declares the game forfeited to the homestanding Bulls 9-0. After the game, Bear tells the media that unless Durham leaves the league his team will withdraw from the six-team circuit. Later that evening, Bear goes to Durham's Central Hotel and assaults the arbiter in the lobby. Bear is arrested and eventually fined \$28.50, including \$3.50 for court costs.

Three years later, Bear, also a circus trick rider known by his stage name of "Eddie Merode," is found dead in an opium den in Salt Lake City, Utah. A couple of years earlier, Bear, a Wilmington native, had received \$30,000 from his father's estate which he had spent before going into show business.

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
