For the 21-yearold Hile, his start against the Salons marks the final appearance of a less-than-successful three-year minor league career. Spending time with the

Hollywood Stars (1934-35) and the Padres (1936), the Long Beach product is 2-14 in 63 career appearances.

Oakland's rookie shortstop Joe Gordon drives in five runs with two singles, a triple and a home run while 25-year-old right fielder Jack Glynn has seven RBIs on three hits. A veteran of seven minor league seasons, Glynn retires after the 1940 season to become a player-manager of the Franklin Athletic Club in New Jersey's Inter-County semipro league. Glynn studied for Catholic priesthood during his playing career and never was known to swear.
