## LYNCHBURG FANS TO HEAR CROCKETT

Lypchburg, Va., Pobrany 34.—David Crockett, who has been engaged for a meath or more in an effort to organize a D class baseball league, to be composed of towns in Virginia not now in baseball, is in the city to-day for that purpose, and he has requested a conference with faus interested at the Hotel Carroll baturday afternoon at 2 ordesk.

Some time ago Danville lined solidly behind the proposed organization, and some interest has been shown in Charlettesville and Staunton, but it is regarded as doubtful if Lynchburg will care to go into the erraphation.

Staunton businessman David Crockett's attempt to form a Class D minor league in the Commonwealth begins with a meeting in Lynchburg, with interested fans.

Danville has already committed to the formation of the league while Staunton, Charlottesville, Clifton Forge and Covington have shown interest in joining only if Crockett can bring Lynchburg into the fold.

Unfortunately for Crockett, a man "high up" in the city's Chamber of Commerce says, "Lynchburg may someday fall heir to a franchise in some other faster league and the city could ill afford to be coupled up with a Class D circuit with towns of 5,000 people in such a contingency, which would prevent getting away to grab something better."

Lynchburg elects not to joining the fledgling circuit and will remain en it rejoins the Virginia (C) League

out of organized baseball until 1917, when it rejoins the Virginia (C) League.

Three weeks later, Charlottesville, Clifton Forge, Covington and Staunton regroup to form the Virginia Mountain (D) League. On July 25, after a little more than two months into the season, league officials will suspend operations due to financial problems caused by poor attendance and rumors of possible game fixing among the players.
