Newly-acquired outfielder Frank "Piggy" Ward is impressive (needless to say) in his Cincinnati debut by reaching base in all eight plate appearances in a 30-12 win over last-place Louisville. The game is the first of a month-long, 26-game home stand for the Reds.

The 26-year-old Ward is 2-for-2, with five walks and is hit by a pitch. He scores three times and commits an error in only fielding opportunity.

The opposing pitcher that afternoon is Bill Rotes (not Rhodes as carried in the box score), making his second career major league start. The "Pennsylvania Phenom" gives up 14 runs in the first inning alone and 16 over the next seven. He allows 30

Ward was acquired on June 16 by the Reds, along with \$1,500 from the Baltimore Orioles for pitcher Tony Mullane.
